Intro to 2 Timothy 1:8-14

Pastor Don mentioned that the doctrine of election is always used for practical purposes in Scripture. If we are to live lives unashamed of Christ and His gospel, then one important piece is going to be to understand that doctrine. J.I. Packer describes it this way: “Before Creation, God selected out of the human race, foreseen as fallen, those whom He would redeem, bring to faith, justify, and glorify in and through Jesus Christ...in Scripture, it is a pastoral doctrine, brought in to help Christians see how great is the grace that saves them, and to move them to humility, confidence, joy, praise, faithfulness, and holiness in response.” (*Concise Theology*)

This signals to us that though the world may give us cause to be ashamed of Christ (either through mocking the message or our way of life or persecuting us some other way), we can be confident that, being chosen by God, we will not be ashamed in the long run. When Jesus returns and settles all the scores on the “Day” that Paul refers to in 2 Timothy, then we will be vindicated. This is the hope we have because of the doctrine of election.

Context

Paul begins to develop his main arguments in the letter in this section (1:8-14). The call to embrace suffering (also 2:3 and 4:5) is almost as ubiquitous as Paul’s references to his own suffering (2:9 and 3:11). However, the idea of suffering and impending death is colored by the triumph of the gospel and the “promise of life” held out in it. Paul does not call Timothy to share in suffering apart from the glorious realities of eternal life and the example he himself has set out for Timothy. Certainly in all of Paul’s letters the theology is intertwined with practical living, but perhaps this letter makes it the most personal of all.
