Intro to Ephesians 6:1-4

The gospel has implications for every area of life. Over the past couple of weeks, we have seen the immense implications the gospel has in marriage. The commands that Paul issues in chapters 4-6 of Ephesians flow directly from the glorious realities of the gospel. So, it makes perfect sense that the gospel would have implications for the way we parent as well.

One aspect of the gospel that has direct implications for the way we parent is obedience. Often times, parents will focus on getting their kids to behave a certain way so that their lives will be easier. But the gospel teaches us that behavior cannot be changed apart from a changed heart. The gospel aims at getting us to understand our need to obey God. While obedience certainly has behavioral implications, it is fundamentally a relationship dynamic. It is a heart issue. So, when Paul exhorts the children to obey their parents, he is admonishing them to relate to their parents in a way that resembles how we all ought to relate to God.

He follows this up with an important exhortation to parents to not provoke their children. As children are supposed to relate to their parents as subjects the way we are all subject to God, so also parents are to imitate God in how they treat their children. Hence, Paul insists that parents lovingly discipline their kids and train them in the instruction of the Lord, not to dominate them, but to enable them to truly flourish in life.

Context

This section comes on the heels of what are commonly referred to as the “household codes” (Eph. 5:22-6:9; Col. 3:18-4:1). These “codes” are largely commands that flow from the indicative realities stated in earlier chapters.
