Introduction to Ephesians 4:11-16

D. Martyn Lloyd-Jones was a long-time pastor of the Westminster Chapel in London. In reflecting on this passage, he once said, “what matters in the church... is not what our peculiar calling or office is, or the particular grace which has been given to us according to the measure of the gift of Christ; what matters is that every one of us should be perfect in that position. Each one of us is meant to be filled with His life. Each member does not contain the same amount, but each is full.”

It seems in the life of the church, that we can too often place special emphasis on one calling or office over another, in which case some are left unengaged because their calling is not valued. Like a muscle group that is left unexercised for months on end, these people find themselves to be an atrophy in the church. The body is not growing into maturity, because some are not using their Christ-filled gifts to serve others or to build up the body. In this passage, Paul reminds us that each member is valuable to the body and in fact, the body cannot grow into maturity without each person functioning as they ought.

Context

In the first section of Ephesians 4, Paul describes what unity in the church ought to look like and the reason for its existence. Here in this section, Paul is unpacking that further by describing the diversity of gifts which Christ has given, but reminds them that the diversity of gifts is designed to build up the unified body of Christ toward maturity. All of this talk about unity and diversity will be further unpacked as Paul, in chapters 4-6, begins to describe behaviors consistent with our profession of faith in Christ and our identity as the unified body of Christ here on earth.
