## **Intro to James 5:16-18**

If we were all honest with ourselves, we would recognize that we probably don't pray as we ought to pray. It's amazing how many exhortations there are in Scripture to pray, to pray with right motives, to persevere in prayer, and many more. Even more significantly, Scripture is filled with examples of God answering prayers in the most profound ways.

One could easily think of Moses' interactions with the Lord where he spoke to Him as though speaking to a friend (Ex. 33:11). Or David, who prayed to the Lord constantly before battle or before ascending the throne of Judah and witnessed how the Lord answered those prayers in mighty ways (2 Sam. 2:1-4). Or Solomon, whose prayer at the dedication of the Temple, which proved prophetic in so many ways as the Lord brought about what was prayed (1 Kings 8:22-53). One of the most striking is the example of Elijah, who prayed that the rain would be stopped according to the promise of God (Deut. 11:13-17; 1 Kings 8:35-36). However, Scripture holds up Elijah as a man with a nature like ours. Thus, as we draw near to God and purify ourselves, we can be confident that He will answer according to His will.

## **Context**

As Pastor Don pointed out, much of James' letter is concerned with prayer. He is writing to a people who are suffering, and the most important concern of the suffering person must be to pray. In fact, because we are always in need, it should actually be our main concern all of the time (1 Thess. 5:17). But James is speaking specifically to encourage suffering people that God not only hears our prayers, but He works powerfully through them to accomplish great and good things for His people. He is almighty and He is trustworthy. He will act on our behalf, if we approach Him according to His word.
