Intro to John 10:7-18

Remembering is a fundamental discipline of the Christian life. Thirteen times in the Book of Deuteronomy, Moses exhorts the people of Israel to remember their former situation as slaves in Egypt, to remember the great works that God performed on their behalf to rescue them from slavery, and to remember the holiness of life that He called them to in the commandments. In a similar way, Paul repeatedly exhorts people in his letters to remember: to remember their former way of life (apart from Christ), to remember the sacrifice that Christ made on their behalf to reconcile them to God, and to remember the holy life that they had been called to as well.

So, the concept of “memorial” has deep roots, not only as a ceremonial act (though there is that too), but more deeply as a means by which we draw near to God in deeper trust and devotion. Thus, we as followers of Jesus should have a regular discipline of remembering our former way of life and how God brought us to Himself. Even if we don’t have many memories from before we became Christians, we surely all have memories of what life is like when we give ourselves over to sin and temptation and, practically-speaking, reject the good authority of Christ over us (see Luke 6:46)

Context

There are many unique features of John’s Gospel. One of the unique features is that John does not tell the stories of Jesus telling His disciples directly that He was going to suffer and die. In Matthew, Mark, and Luke, Jesus’s foretelling of His suffering and death are prominently placed throughout. In John, Jesus speaks primarily of His “hour,” which is the moment of His suffering/crucifixion. He also speaks, here at least, of “laying down” His life for us. The effect is the same.

 - o He gave His life willingly
 - o He gave His life purposefully
 - o He gave His life to defeat a common enemy

We must faithfully and forever remember the sacrifice of Christ!

Discuss

- 1) As you remember your way of life apart from Christ, who or what primarily influenced you? Why were they so compelling to you then? And how do you view them differently now?
- 2) What is it about Jesus as our shepherd that makes Him “the Good Shepherd”?
- 3) How easy or difficult is it for you to resonate with Jesus calling us “sheep” in this passage? Why is that?
- 4) Read v. 18 again. How is Jesus’s authority in this verse a comfort to the sheep?
- 5) How disciplined are you in “remembering Christ”? What does that look like practically in your life?
