## **Intro to Matthew 14:22-33**

It is unfortunate that debates about God's sovereignty among Christians often miss the aim of the Bible's teaching on the subject. More often than not, God's sovereignty is expressed in Scripture not as a way to define its scope relative to our free will, but rather it is there to comfort His people. Theology is never meant to be fodder for cold or unfeeling debate. The truths about God revealed in Scripture are for us to know Him more deeply. This is precisely what is being taught in Matthew 14.

Jesus knew that sending the disciples out in the boat would put them in a precarious position, and yet He had a purpose in doing that. He wanted to demonstrate His power in the midst of our weakness so that we could find comfort and put our trust in Him rather than in our own strength. So, as we think about the current situation, let's remember that we ought not rely on our own strength or our own wisdom, as those things will fail us in the long term anyway. Rather, let us learn to depend on God's sovereign grace and find rest for our souls in Him.

### **Context**

The Book of Matthew has a lot to teach us about Jesus's authority. From the very beginning, we learn that He is the Christ, the Son of David (1:1). This means that He is the One that God promised long ago who would reign not only over the people of Israel but over the entire world as God's appointed king. The book ends on a similar note as Jesus gathers His disciples for one final conversation, and He begins by informing them that all authority has been given to Him in heaven and on earth (28:18). All throughout the rest of the book, Matthew tells the story of Jesus in such a way that we really come to understand His authority and—specifically in our passage—how His authority is our comfort in the midst of trials.

- 5) How does knowing the patience of Jesus and His purpose in sending us out "into the storm" impact the way you approach this situation?
