III. Details about Small Groups

D. ETC (brainstorm)

- A. <u>Size of Groups:</u> 5-12 people (Groups that get bigger than 12 eventually "birth" into two or more daughter groups)
- B. <u>Leadership of Groups:</u> A trained college <u>leader</u> and <u>multiplier</u> (apprentice preparing to lead their own group someday)

<u>Co-leader</u> is also a good option, but it is still important to have a multiplier.

C. <u>Curriculum</u>: Left up to leaders and members to decide. (Should be prayed over and well thought through. Why and <u>what</u> would be best for the group as a whole). Options may include a study of one of the Gospels, (i.e. 24 Hours with John by Jim Petersen) or an Epistle, O.T. Book, N.T. Book, Character Studies, Topical Series, Experiencing God workbook type study, or Purpose Driven Life Book, plus many other resource books we have available or could direct you toward.

## So What Are We Cellin'?

## Cells Defined...

A cell is a group of 5 to 12 people who form a community to experience the love of God, grow in relationship with others, and reach out to the lost. We call our cells "Lifegroups."

## Why Cells?

- They translate to anywhere in the world. In any culture or situation, cell groups and the relationships involved in them are an effective way to share the Gospel.
- They provide a great training ground (for our college students) giving them practical leadership training and ministry responsibility.
- Cell groups foster a practical spirituality, not just a faith based on church attendance.
- Cells are incredibly effective because they are based on relationships not a personality or program.

The Key to Effective Cell Ministry is RELATIONSHIPS!!

## Relationships

When a Gallop poll survey asked what reasons people had for going to church, they answered:

- 1. To believe life is meaningful and has a purpose.
- To have a sense of community and deeper relationships.
- To be appreciated and respected.
- To be listened to and heard.
- 5. To feel that one is growing in the faith.
- 6. To have practical help in developing a mature faith.

## What is Cell Winistry??

The human body is composed of many units that join to from the body as a whole. These units are called cells. A baby starts out as a single cell in its mother's womb, and then grows and multiplies into two cells. These two cells them become four, and the four become eight, and the eight become sixteen, and so on... Soon, one cell has become a human body, full of life and wonder!

A cell group is a group of 5 to 12 people who form a community to experience the love of God, grow in relationship with others and reach out to the lost.

Sharing our lives and hearts with one another in the presence of Jesus will knit us together into a strong fabric that cannot be broken. The strength of the individual is no longer the only factor determining his/her walk with God. The rest of the cell undergrids each member with prayer, encouragement and vision for the lost to keep them growing in Christ.

Jesus in the midst, is the strength of the group. Jesus is the only one that can provide the power and vision to walk out the Christian life. When the cell comes together for edification, the focus is on experiencing Jesus in every part of the meaning.

Cells are for both evangelism and edification. If a cell does not bring in others, grow and multiply, it will become a self-focused care group that will eventually grow bored and die. If a cell does not pastor and edify it's people, it will not develop leadership, it won't develop character in it people, and people will eventually fall away from walking with God (or they will go somewhere else where they can be fed). The group must focus both on building one another up and targeting, praying for, and reaching out to the lost.

## small Group Worship


#### Goal:

To exalt the Lord Jesus and provide a time of worship that incorporates every individual regardless of their level of freedom in worship.

## Key Word: SIMPLICITY

#### Examples of Worship:

- singing (structured and non-structured)
- reading scripture
- sitting quietly
- encouraging each other
- giving testimonies of praise
- making expression of the heart
- using the Psalms



#### While in Private

- 1. Daily be involved in private worship, but it should not replace Bible Study and prayer time.
- 2. Pray, pray, pray, and pray some more.
- 3. Find out what God has to say about worship and commit to memorizing those scriptures. (Use the Psalms to start.)
- 4. Practice! The more comfortable that you become playing your instrument, the greater freedom you will feel in trying new ideas.

## While in Lifegroup

- 1. Only introduce one new song at a time.
- 2. Don't do a completely different set of songs each week. In other words, overlap a lot from week to week.
- 3. Repetition is your friend!
- 4. Slower songs usually work best, especially for the less skilled guitarist.
- 5. Discern where levels of freedom are. Allow the Holy Spirit to move the group on at His pace.
- Pick songs that you are comfortable with and have already incorporated into your private worship time.
- 7. Pick songs that don't have many verses or complicated echo parts.
- Only have two to four songs on the song sheet. Don't hand out a song book!
- Tune your guitar before the LG.
- 10. Try not to use sheet music when playing.
- 11. Allow Lifegroupers to make requests from week to week.
- 12. You need to be sensitive to the Holy Spirit.
- 13. Use a pick when you are playing, because the louder sound will let people feel more comfortable to sing.
- 14. Sing loudly, because you are the leader.

## How to evaluate the potential of a particular song for LG:

- Does this song exalt Jesus? Is it understandable and is it simple?
- 2. Is this song too long? Can we grasp the theme in the short time that we have?
- 3. Is this song difficult or easy to sing? Does it have tricky rhythms? Is it too high or too low? 4. Does the group know this song and can they as a group, sing it?



## Eight Benefits of Cell Winistry

Bethany World Prayer Center Lists Eight Benefits of doing cell ministry:

- To Make Disciples- Christianity is easily modeled and reproduced in others in cell based ministry. There is absolutely no substitute for modeling and example.
- To Develop a Life of Prayer- The disciples learned to pray by watching
  Jesus pray and asking questions. Cell ministry facilitates both praying for specific
  things and watching God accomplish them.
- 3. To Develop Strong Fellowship- Today's consumer based church does not encourage strong relationships to be formed. American people learn independence and isolation from the church as well as society at large. In cell ministry, the body of Christ works together. Relationships and community are stressed. People have a place to serve and use their gifts.
- 4. Body Ministry- Every person ministering on Sunday morning is impossible, but the cell provides a place for every person to minister to the body of Christ for edification! Large groups are to equip the saints, small groups are to practice what is taught. Cell ministry uses both.
- 5. Pastoral Care- When Moses was breaking under the strain of ministering to all of the Israelites, his father-in-law gave him a plan that broke the Israelites down into groups of thousands, hundreds, fifties, and tens. Cell groups use this kind of model to allow everyone to be shepherded effectively.
- 6. Raising Up Ministers- Gifts can be developed in hands on practice in cell ministry, and things that one learns will be passed on to many.
- 7. Evangelism- Through cell groups, souls can be saved daily. Fishers of men can be trained up for the harvest. Those that are wounded and hurting will respond and communities can be penetrated with the gospel.
- 8. The Return of the Ministry to the Lay Church- Jesus did not just call us to be reconciled to God, but to take this ministry of reconciliation to the world. Cell groups give a place for the lay person to put this into practice!
